

Earlier this year, Ginny Jones, a resident of Vanadium Woods Village in Bridgeville, spearheaded a celebration to honor the dedicated service of activities coordinator Gina Straight. With the support of staff and other residents, Ginny was able to throw a party that included custom T-shirts, party favors, and candies imprinted with Gina's name. More than 100 residents and staff attended the party.

"No one has ever done anything like this for me before," Gina said. "I will never forget this day." Gina enjoys making sure residents are happy and getting the most out of their day. She has great passion for what she does and feels she has grown more confident over the last 11 years in this role.

"When you see those smiling faces, then you know you're doing your job," said Gina.

UPMC Senior Communities is collaborating with a local nonprofit to feed people in need in neighboring communities. *Living Stones*, a South Hills-based charitable organization, currently collects excess food weekly from Asbury Heights in Mt. Lebanon, Strabane Trails Village independent living and Strabane Woods assisted living in Washington, and Vanadium Woods Village independent living in Bridgeville.

"This is an immediate opportunity to address hunger in our community. *Living Stones* is preparing meals for more than 350 individuals in need. four times a month, at no charge, using the food they collect from UPMC Senior Communities and other participating local restaurants and facilities. We're off to a great start with our South Hills locations and hope to expand our participation," says John Rizzo, Director of Dietary and Housekeeping Services for UPMC Senior Communities.

John participates in the Food Safety Committee under the auspices of the Allegheny County Health Department, where responsible,



Edward Yarov was born in 1927 in a small town near Odessa in the Ukraine. As a teenager, he worked 12-hour days in a munition's factory far from home, his family separated by war. He lost his mother and two younger siblings to the Holocaust. Edward travelled from Russia to Pittsburgh in 1993, when the collapse of the Soviet Union made leaving possible, to flee discrimination towards Jewish people.

Despite genuine hardship, you see no evidence of these traumatic experiences in Edward's artwork, which adorns the walls of his home at Heritage Place, a UPMC Senior Communities skilled nursing and rehabilitation facility in Squirrel Hill. Edward's daughter, Irina, says her father cherished his life and his family and friends, from a childhood in rural Ukraine to his elder years here in the city of Pittsburgh. It's reflected in the flowers, animals, landscapes, and cityscapes that are the subjects of much of his art.

Irina explains that Edward takes after his father, himself an artist, and his grandfather, an ironsmith and craftsman in Ukraine who made beautiful ornamental iron gates. As a student, Edward did not excel at other subjects, but art was where he earned praise, and his talent manifested itself at a young age. He received formal education and training as a graphic artist in Moscow. He worked for a newspaper at a time when illustrations were more valued than photographs, and he wrote articles to marry with his art that he sold to other publications. Edward has been a prolific artist and has exhibited here in Pittsburgh at local libraries. Just last year, he walked Irina to a neighborhood pizzeria around the corner from Heritage Place where several of his Italian landscapes hang.

"Art has always been how my father best expressed himself," says Irina. "He never did it for the money, but for the pleasure that it would bring him and others." She is grateful to the staff at Heritage Place for having supported him in this, allowing him to use his room as his painting space. Irina recalls times when the staff brought him pencils and paper for drawing as well.

Edward's beloved wife, Alla, resides at Heritage Place also. Both speak Russian and are living with varying degrees of dementia. Irina, who lives in Holland, says the staff has been "amazing" to Edward and Alla. Both Irina, a head nurse, and Lana, a nursing assistant, speak Russian and are available to interpret for them; Lana even accompanies Edward to doctor's appointments to serve in this capacity.

Irina emphasizes that everyone from Melodie in nursing to Tom in social service to Michael in administration has been invaluable in tending to Edward and Alla and in problem-solving through the complications of language, distance, and "red tape."

Although Edward's ability to paint is declining, his love for his wife and his family are not. True to the life of an artist, his eye for what is beautiful in life is undiminished.



VIETNAM VET CONTINUES TO SERVE

UPMC Senior Communities is privileged to be home to more than 650 veterans. We strive to honor them by sharing their stories. Meet someone who is still serving.



Ron Boyden, a resident of Beatty Point Village independent living in Monroeville, has a quick grin, a warm handshake, and a humble nature. But don't let that fool you. He has a fierce, intelligent strength that saw him through combat in the Vietnam War and 20 years of service in the United States Army, 10 of which were spent as a drill sergeant. Soft spoken though he may be now, he is a force, and he continues to put that to good purpose in the service of others, specifically the men and women he visits weekly at the Veterans Administration Hospital (VA).

Known as "Rice Paddy Daddy" and "Big Man" in his Vietnam days, Ron explains that he was destined to be a soldier. Born in September 1941, he jokes that when Pearl Harbor was bombed three months later, he stood up in his crib and said, "I wanna fight!" He remembers how he tried to enlist at age 14 when he lost a cousin to the Korean War. Three years later, his father took him to enlist, "to keep him out of trouble."

Keeping out of trouble became considerably harder when war broke out in Vietnam, but Ron was tested and found equal from the start. Though he is decorated with two bronze stars, he is most proud of his Combat Infantry Badge, earned the first night he arrived in Vietnam, when he found himself amid an intense jungle firefight.

Ron's most vivid memory from his time in Vietnam is harrowing. He recalls being on the ground under fire with his buddy by his side. The helicopter dispatched to get them wound up leaving them behind to avoid getting shot down. Ron says he and his buddy looked at each other as if to say, "How did we wind up here?" and with no other option, set about finding their way back to their company, which they eventually did.

The Army took Ron to many places, including Washington state, Hawaii, and a tour in Germany, where he had his own basketball team and did some boxing. He notes his German unit was the first to mechanize and the last to see active combat on the DMZ bridge.

For the last 19 years, Ron's commitment to the Army has been taking him to the VA, where he makes weekly visits, bearing donuts to share that he has collected from various local bakeries. He leaves at 5 a.m. to begin the collection and often does not return home until past dinner time. He sees how the younger veterans today struggle with many of the same demons that plagued his fellow soldiers of the Vietnam Era, including addiction.

Ron explains that the Army taught him discipline and how to get along with others, even in navigating the racial tensions of the day. He says he has learned to focus on the good and is hoping that will make a difference to the soldiers he spends time with today.

The Swans of Sherwood Oaks

As you arrive on the campus of Sherwood Oaks, a continuing care community in Cranberry Township, you are greeted by a peaceful body of water nestled in the heart of the campus. On March 21, 2016, the 10-month-old swans arrived at their new home on Lake Sherwood. The former owners brought the two swans to the edge of the lake where several staff members introduced them to their new home.

A naming contest for the swan brothers was held a month after their arrival. Residents and staff proposed 43 name combinations. The decision was put to a ballot, and Sherman and Oakley were chosen with 87 votes.

Sherman and Oakley celebrated their first birthday on May 15 of that year, nearly two months since their first encounter on Lake Sherwood. Residents and staff celebrated with birthday cake and good wishes – and have done so every year since! "I love taking their pictures for our newsletter," said Tabatha Alford, Executive Assistant at Sherwood Oaks. "I can honestly say they are the most photographed residents on the campus!"

The swans have found their way into the hearts or those who live, work, and volunteer at Sherwood Oaks, and they have also been theinspiration for several pieces of artwork. One of these pieces includes a quilt made and donated by Kathy Vacca, Billing Specialist, in honor of their fourth birthday earlier this year. The quilt is now on display in Sherwood's Community Center for everyone to enjoy.

Sherman and Oakley have been synonymous with Sherwood Oaks during these last few years – almost as if they are mascots! Having such beautiful and graceful campus representatives reminds us what aging can be; in the right environment and with the proper support, growing old can be a thing of beauty.

"We have updated the whole audiovisual system in the Conference Center," Christine Cassese, Cumberland Woods Village Life Enrichment and Event Coordinator, said. "Each conference room now has very user-friendly "smart" podiums, overhead microphones were added throughout the rooms, and conference call capability can run simultaneously in each room. The technology is much easier to use, and there's a lot more of it!"

In addition, projectors in each room have been upgraded, and an extra projector screen has been added in Conference Room 1. Usage of the Legacy Conference Center is 85% full-at-all times throughout the year, as many UPMC hospitals and business lines rent the Conference Center year-round.

An entirely new lighting and sound system, as well as the addition of a "smart" podium, is planned for the Legacy Theatre in early 2020. This upgrade will improve the experience for attendees of The Legacy Lineup



events, which includes a full, annual schedule of live national-touring acts, educational seminars and, movies.

The Legacy Theatre is a great resource and social outlet for seniors, with annual attendance exceeding 13,000 patrons, and more than 81,000 patrons since offerings began in January 2012. Patrons come from a 15-mile radius; only 4% of the attendees are residents of UPMC Senior Communities. In 2019, tickets to The Legacy Lineup productions were 85% sold out for all shows by May 2019.


